

What is climate change?



- Human activities produce emissions that trap heat in the atmosphere
 - Caused about 2° F of global warming since 1880

Climate Impacts in Washington

- Changes in water supply (snow, rain, streamflow, drought)
- Sea level rise
- Wildfire
- Extreme heat



Climate Element

Climate planning is a new goal of the Growth Management Act

Adds two sub-elements:

- **Resilience** mandatory for all fully planning jurisdictions.
- **Mitigation** (GHG Emissions Reduction) mandatory for 11 counties and their cities over 6,000 pop.
 - Focus of Fall COM <u>workshops</u>


Environmental justice (EJ)

- Climate Element must:
 - Prioritize EJ
- Land Use Element must avoid worsening environmental health disparities.
- Transportation Element must create multimodal levels to achieve EJ goals
- Grants for community-based organizations to advance participation of overburdened communities in planning process

New roles for Commerce

City/County may submit Climate Mitigation sub-element for approval

- Applicable to cities/counties required to include sub-element
- Effective date would be when approved by Commerce
- Appeals to the Growth Management Hearings Board would be limited to non-compliance with guidance.
- GHG reduction element not subject to administrative or judicial appeal

Climate Resilience:

"The ongoing process of anticipating, preparing for, and adapting to changes in climate and minimizing negative impacts to our natural systems, infrastructure, and communities."

- RCW 70A.65.010




Greenhouse gas emissions reduction sub-element

Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions reduction sub-element

Definition - GHG emissions mitigation

Actions taken to reduce or eliminate the greenhouse gases (present and future) in order to reduce the rate and extent of climate change damage.

How to achieve GHG emission reductions?

Evaluations, inventories and goals & policies

Pathway 1 Select GHG reduction measures	Develop GHG reduction goals and policies based directly on measures in Section 5	
Pathway 2 GHG emission estimates	Develop GHG reduction goals and policies using Ecology framework and sample measures in Section 5	Integrate goals and
Pathway 3 Vehicle miles traveled (VMT) study/evaluation	Develop specific VMT/GHG reduction goals and policies. Only transportation emission sources are evaluated.	policies into a comprehensive plan
Pathway 4 Emission inventories	Develop GHG reduction goals and policies based on emission inventory modeling results.



Planning Grants

- Awarding ~\$30M in grants each biennium
- Fully planning cities and counties are eligible
- Priority for 2025 and 2026 update jurisdictions
- Additional funding available through 2029, with an annual application period
- Grant applications due Oct. 31, 5:00pm
